Program Description: The district is applying for a Race to the Top District grant to fund the Schools of Promise Initiative, an expansion of the Fairmount Park Children's Initiative pilot program that was implemented in Pinellas in 2009. The initiative was modeled after the Harlem Children Zone, designed to address the academic disparities and deficiencies among subgroups -particularly African Americans; as reflected in the student achievement data. The project will focus on academic excellence, professional development, school readiness, social services, extended learning program (before and after care), enrichment activities, and community integration. The project plan was strategically designed to target schools with 50% or higher African American student population, 75% or higher student population that receives Free/Reduced lunch, designated school grade of D's or F's, and identified feeder patterns that will eventually scale to the middle and high school. The five target schools are within a 2-7 mile radius, and include zip codes which make-up a conglomerate of impoverished neighborhoods. They include: Fairmount Park Elementary, Melrose Elementary, Campbell Park Elementary, Azalea Middle, and John Hopkins Middle.

Rationale: The Schools of Promise Initiative is in direct alignment with the district's strategic goals. It will focus on increasing achievement for all students, with an emphasis on closing the achievement gap, and turning around lowest performing schools. The project will benefit the

entire district by giving specialized support to the neediest populations, while developing and vetting processes and services that can be scaled.
